TLC Home Group Expectations

- Please start and end on time. If you'd like to provide an atmosphere of fellowship, it's better that you provide this at the end to allow people who have to leave the opportunity to do so.
- Allow silence. Allow room for others to contemplate and even feel uncomfortable when asking someone to read, within group prayer, or when throwing out a question. Please don't rush in just to fill the space. Allow God to do what only He can.
- When sharing, make it about you and what God is revealing about you and or Him. Please allow room for others to share (don't dominate).

New Identities Ephesians 2:19-22

When someone asks who you are, what comes to mind first?

Peace between two groups that have nothing in common is the theme of the passage before this (2:11-18). It's brought about "by the blood of Christ" (2:13-14), and this **peace's implications** are in our passage this week...

Read Ephesians 2:19-22

• What implications, benefits, or realities come from this peace?

Verse 19 says that we Gentiles are "no longer foreigners and strangers." This is written in a past tense, and focuses on **the bad of our past**.

- Talk about a time you felt like a foreigner or stranger somewhere.
 - Did something/someone change in that situation that made you feel like a "fellow citizen" or "member of [their] household"?
 - How does this relate to how we are foreigners and strangers <u>to</u> <u>each other</u> without Jesus?
 - How does this relate to how we are foreigners and strangers <u>to</u>
 <u>God</u> without Jesus?

- Who are the "foreigners and strangers" in your life, who you can seek to bring into relationship with God?
- Throughout the Bible, we read about our **total depravity**, telling us why we *should* be strangers/foreigners to God. Have some people in your group read the following verses: Ephesians 2:1-3, Ephesians 2:12, Jeremiah 17:9, Isaiah 64:6, Romans 3:10-18 (notice each aspect of a person that is listed as being corrupt).
 - What's your understanding/experience with total depravity?
 - How does your understanding/experience with total depravity impact your understanding/experience with God's love?

Verse 21 says we, as Christians, are "joined together." This is written in a past tense, and focuses on the good of Jesus' completed work for us.

- How have you seen this reality in your Home Group (or your life)?
- These believing Jews and Gentiles had very little in common <u>except</u> for Jesus. How could/should this change our view of people that we have little-to-no commonalities with?
- Read John 6:37-40. How does this impact your confidence in the security of Jesus saving you?
- How can you better embrace your identity in Christ? How can you let go of some of your earthly/temporary "identities" (job, roles, nationality, background, etc.) that you hold onto?

Verse 22 says we are "being built together to become a dwelling in which God lives by his Spirit." This is written in a present/future tense and focuses on **the Spirit's ongoing work in our lives**, through Himself and each other.

- How can you as a Home Group lean into this reality, to be built even closer together? What do you need from each other?
- How does/can/should this reality (that the Spirit lives in *all* believers) impact how we interact with each other?
